SUMMER CAMP

One of my favorite parts about camp is interacting with parents who enthusiastically express to me, "this place hasn't changed!" When I first heard that, I recoiled and tried to explain our work "improving the facilities and the grounds." However, I'm always quickly met with a rebuttal. They mean that the heart of His Hill has remained the same since they were campers until now. While their kids are here, they know that they will hear about Jesus just as they had when they were kids.

The years have passed, counselors have come and gone, "but the word of God endures forever" (1 Peter 1:25). ACTING ON THE TRUTH CEASE STRIVING AND KNOW

The Word of God brings peace to the troubled heart. Psalm 46 was meant for that purpose.

Verses 1-3 tell us that God is our protection. "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear, though the earth should change, and though the mountains slip into the heart of the sea; though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains quake at its swelling pride. Selah."

God is our refuge and strength – not "might be" or "will be" but "is." He is our place of security. Not home, savings, friends, or family. God is our refuge.

He is Himself our strength. He doesn't just impart strength to us, He gives us Himself. We are weak, He is strong. That will never change.

When we are insecure, frightened, even terrified, the one to run to for refuge is God. When we are weak and helpless, our strength is God Himself.

He is "a very present help in trouble." He is not a distant hope. He is a present help. A very present help. How present? For the Christian, He actually indwells us. Do we believe this?

If we take refuge in Him and find strength in Him who is very present, "we will not fear." Even if the world is falling apart around us, we will not fear if we reckon on God who IS our refuge, strength, and very present help.

Selah – the Psalmist is saying, "pause, reflect, absorb, ponder" these things. Don't hurry past these truths. Let them settle over you and in you.

Verses 4-7 speak of God's provision for us. "There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the Holy dwelling places of the Most High. God is in the midst of her, she will not be moved; God will help her when morning dawns.

The nations made an uproar, the kingdoms tottered; He raised His voice, the earth melted. The Lord of Hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold. Selah"

The Bible tells us that in the New Jerusalem a river will flow out from His throne, through the city, and into the ocean -- purifying the whole ocean (Ezek. 47; Rev. 22). This river is a river of life and brings life wherever it goes.

This city is the dwelling place of the Most High, the God above all gods. He is in the midst of her. Therefore, she will not be moved. She is absolutely secure and safe because of His presence. Jerusalem wasn't safe because she was situated on a mountain and surrounded by a wall. She was safe because God was in her. Likewise, our protection is ultimately only Jesus.

The nations may all be in an uproar against God's holy city (or against His holy people – which includes us), but God simply raises His voice and the earth melts away.

The Lord of Hosts – the God of all that there is – is with us. The God of Jacob – who is the God of Israel – is our stronghold. Again, not "shall be, or will be, or might be." He IS with us. He IS our stronghold.

Selah – once again, take time to pause, reflect on, and absorb this. God's presence with us keeps us safe and provides us with all that we need. He is our river of life. He is our stronghold.

Verses 8-11 exhort us to Come, Cease Striving, and Know that the Lord is God. "Come, behold the works of the Lord, who has wrought desolations in the earth. He makes wars to cease to the end of the earth. He breaks the bow and cuts the spear in two; He burns the chariots with fire. Cease striving and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth. The Lord of Hosts is with us; The God of Jacob is our stronghold. Selah"

"Come, behold the works of the Lord . . ." What works? His works to end war and bring peace. The day is coming when Jesus will do exactly that. He will bring everlasting peace and put all His enemies under His feet. God will do this, not men.

"Cease striving." The battle is His. Rest. Stop fighting. Stop trying to win. Stop defending yourself and your interests. Stop the anxious striving to keep your world from falling apart. Stop striving to bring peace by your own strength. Stop!

Have you come to the place where you recognize that you can't win the battle – the battle against sin, the world, the devil? The battle against difficult people? If there is nothing more you can do, and you are utterly powerless to bring victory in any area of your life, you are in a good place. God can now be your refuge, strength, very present help, and stronghold.

His call to you is, "Cease striving and know that I am God." You really do not need to fight. It is doing no good. Stop defending yourself. Die to yourself. Put yourself in the hands of the One who when He speaks the earth melts away, the One who brings an end to all war.

God will be exalted in this earth. It is an absolute certainty. We may not see it in our lifetimes, but God will be exalted. Thank Him for who He is, for His power, His presence, His protection, His provision and His peace. He is Himself the answer to the conflict around us and within us. Come and behold Him and His works. Cease striving. Know that He is God. It isn't complicated! Will we trust Him, believe Him to be God, to be our very present help in trouble? The alternative is to continue on in fear, weakness, and restless, endless striving.
